#### **Gospel Meditation**

Of all Jesus' miracles, the most unsettling might be when he made a dead person alive. We know of three times when he did so: a girl, a young man, and Lazarus. The miracle teaches us he has the power of life and death. He anticipates his resurrection. Sin hurts us. Some sin kills us, spiritually. The three miracles reveal to us that no matter our circumstances, Jesus can give life to us.

The three miracles are instructive of the three ways we feel dead. The little dead girl symbolizes sin before it has time to mature. She's in bed and, once alive, gets right back to her life. The young man is lying in his casket in a funeral procession. This is sin allowed to fester, to grow and become somewhat normalized. Once raised, he has a short walk back home. Lazarus, a full-grown dead man, lies wrapped in burial bands in the tomb. Once he is raised, much needs to be done. He'll need to remove those bands, find new clothes, and travel all the way back home. That is sin allowed to go all the way, unchecked for months or years. It's the most spectacular of the three and reveals Jesus' glory more than the others.

What hope that should give us, for us and those whom we love! Jesus knows our sin hurts us and can even kill us spiritually. No matter the extent of the damage, he is always ready for the miracle of making the dead fully alive.

#### **Scripture Reflections**

#### First Reading

God revealed to the prophet Ezekiel his divine plan for the resurrection of the dead: "I (will) open your graves and make you come up out of them, my people!" As a person of faith, how does this promise give you hope?

#### Second Reading

Paul insists that for believers, the Spirit dwelling within us gives life to our mortal bodies, raising us from the dead as Christ was raised from the dead. How does this impact your thoughts about death itself?

#### Gospel

In her grief and sadness at the death of her brother Lazarus, Martha professes her belief in Jesus as the Messiah, the Son of God. As the season of Lent draws to a close, in what ways have the last 40 days strengthened your faith in Jesus as our Lord and Savior?

#### **Prayer as Meditation**

The Catechism explains that meditation "engages thought, imagination, emotion, and desire"

Are you looking for a way to pray that "enlightens our mind, makes our understanding radiant, fills the heart with joy, calms fury, dispels wrath, drives away bitterness and thoughts of wickedness, puts irritability to flight, expels laziness, and melts our evil thoughts?" That, says the 5th-century St. Isaias the Hermit, is what meditation will do. "Meditation is a mirror for the mind and light for the conscience. From it is born the tenderness that warms and melts the soul." The Catechism of the Catholic Church speaks of meditation as a "quest" in which "the mind seeks to understand the why and how of the Christian life, in order to adhere and respond to what the Lord is asking" (2705). Meditation "engages thought, imagination, emotion, and desire" in order to "deepen our convictions of faith, prompt the conversion of our heart, and strengthen our will to follow Christ" (2708). When we meditate, we still and quiet ourselves, giving ourselves over to the Presence of God. "Meditation means becoming aware of a truth in such a way that it unfolds before your eyes so that you can penetrate it" (L. Giussani). For meditation "shows us what we want" (St. Bernard). Meditation entails recalling and recollection. Pope Benedict XVI noted that meditation "means to 'remember' what God has done and not to forget all his gifts to us. Meditation is a way in which our mind makes contact with the heart of God." And that contact brings solace and strength to our own heart. Reflecting on her own deep experience of meditation, Servant of God Elisabeth Leseur, encourages us:

Meditation is the gathering of oneself into the very depths of one's being to that point where, in the silencing of outward things, God is found. There you will find the source of all good, strength, and beauty—God. There you will understand both your own weakness and all that you can do here below in the cause of good.



Recognize God in Your Ordinary Moments

#### Offerings

Offer it up. My grandmother used this phrase with her children, and my mother, in turn, used it with me. It's a kind of verbal heirloom, a gift of wisdom from a generation that knew suffering all too well.

We know it to be true that God will work through our suffering if we invite him to. We know it and we have seen it — we have only to look at Lazarus and his sisters Martha and Mary.

But, often, I invite God into my suffering only to tell Him where I want Him to stand. I make an offering of suffering but expect God to do something very specific with it. Teach me this, please. Give me this specific grace. Show me this specific answer.

The happy ending in today's Gospel is not the alleviation of the sorrow Martha and Mary feel because it isn't alleviated, Lazarus is still human, and death still awaits him. Someday, his sisters will have to mourn at his tomb. That loss and pain will not be avoided.

The happy ending is that he is resurrected now, and in doing so, brings so many to belief. The happy ending is that Martha and Mary do not abandon discipleship because things didn't work out exactly the way that they wanted. They run out to meet Christ, eyes dim with tears. They fling themselves into his company and onto his providence.

They made an offering of their suffering, and their happy ending is that their offering was accepted.



#### Who invented the Stations of the Cross?



The first Stations of the Cross were walked by Jesus himself on the way to Calvary. Known as the "Via Dolorosa" ("The Way of Suffering") or the "Via Crucis" ("The Way of the Cross"), it was marked out from the earliest times and was a traditional walk for pilgrims who came to Jerusalem. The early Christians in Jerusalem would walk the same pathway that Jesus walked, pausing for reflection and prayer. Later, when Christians could not travel to the Holy Land, artistic depictions of "The Way of the Cross" were set up in churches, or outside and Christians would walk from station to station, reading the Gospel account of the Passion, or simply praying and reflecting on each event. While the content or place of each station had changed, the intention was to make a mini-pilgrimage and follow--literally--in the footsteps of Jesus.

This devotion became better known in the Middle Ages, and the Franciscans are credited with its spread. Lent is a time when many people make the Stations and some churches present Passion plays or Living Stations. But anyone can pray the Stations at any time. It is a simple and personal reflection on the passion of Jesus and what it means to us.
