Gospel Meditation

There are many things of which we can be afraid: being rebuked, rejection, anger, being challenged, having to defend ourselves, standing alone, insecurity, failure, and even death.

For some, identifying and overcoming their fears is a daunting task. Regardless of how much they may want to break the cycle of fear, they find that they remain close friends with old and dysfunctional behavioral habits and norms. Maybe what they really fear is change. There are many who gravitate to the familiar and comfortable, and find safety and security in doing so, even if they remain mired in mediocrity. Human beings have to learn that there is life beyond the "what has always been" and that happiness and depth are possible when old structures and systems have to be left behind.

Can you leave the near and dear, the comfortable and familiar, the safe and secure, and discover new opportunities? The shear thought of doing so can bring on feelings of apprehension, intense anger, resentment, defensiveness, reluctance, resistance, and even apathy. If we have to be responsible for making the change, cowardice can creep in. If someone else is to blame for making the change, any number of possible negative reactions are possible. In the end, only one thing is required and that is God. If I can rely on and deepen my relationship with God, especially in the Eucharist along with a community of believers, then little else is of great concern. We have to figure out what is really important. It is not always what we think.

The Gospel calls us to stretch ourselves and try new things, not to remain stuck and stagnant in familiar ways. We are asked to live life more deliberately, radically, and intentionally. We are asked to leave the familiar behind and learn to live with changing, and often limiting, human structures. We cannot get too caught up in the physical, ideological, or structural systems we are used to. The Holy Spirit always leads and guides us. If we trust this, we will find ourselves doing things we never thought we could do. Always seek the path to joy and love. They keep us from falling victim to our fears and from seeking the nostalgic crutches we think we need to achieve a sense of well-being and happiness.

Scripture Reflections

First Reading

We hear how the prophet Jeremiah turned to God as he struggled mentally and emotionally to remain faithful to his call. When do you find yourself turning to God in prayer?

Second Reading

Paul speaks of Adam and Christ to describe God's gift of salvation to all who believe. What do you find compelling in Paul's argument?

Gospel Reading

Jesus forewarns his disciples that following him will involve risks and even persecution. Where do you experience risk and/or ridicule as a person of faith?



Coming Back to the Table Just A Reminder

The healthy and safety of each one of you is of utmost importance. If you are within one of the high risk groups (65+ years, have health issues, compromised immune systems) please consider the shelter-in-place ordinances. Individuals who are coming to Mass are required to wear a mask. <u>Please bring your own mask.</u> Wearing gloves are also recommended but not required.


Upon entering please be sure to use the available hand sanitizer. Follow the directions of the ushers in regards to seating in the pews/seats.. Please remember to sit 6-ft apart. Those from the same households may sit closer. Worship aids will not be available.

Communion will only be given in the hand. Remove mask and gloves when receiving the Eucharist. Remember to keep your 6-ft social distancing as you approach the altar.

Once Mass is ended please exit through the designated doors. Please do not congregate or block these entrances. We ask that you exit the building as quickly as possible as each venue must be sanitized in preparation for the next celebration.

If after attending Mass you come down with symptoms and/or test positive for COVID-19, please notify us so that we can take the necessary precautions to ensure the safety of other parishioners, volunteers and staff.

We appreciate you adhering to these guidelines to help make our celebrations safe for all. During this time of transition please be cooperative, patient and flexible.

Inspiration of the Week

Jesus knows that the challenges a disciple of the Gospel will face in the world are real. He tells all of us point blank, "Do not be afraid." There are many things we can fear as we attempt to live the Gospel: unpopularity, being rebuked, rejection, anger, being challenged, having to defend ourselves, standing alone, insecurity, failure, and even death. Many folks know that their faith calls them to live life more deliberately and radically but are cowards when it comes to putting it into practice. We easily justify sticking with the "acceptable" norms with which we are accustomed. These only serve to keep us stuck and mired in mediocrity. The Gospel — given flesh by the very presence of Christ — seeks to stretch, challenge, and change us. We do not have to fear anything, even death. Sometimes, living with our fears brings us a sadly disordered sense of comfort. Maybe what we really fear above all else is change.



Saturday - Sunday


On the weekends, the church will be open from 7am-6pm.

A Father's Day letter from Heaven

"The loss of a child is a black hole into which the entire family falls". The words of Pope Francis express a pain that never goes away. Giovanni had been gone almost 8 years when his father found a letter his son had written to him before he died. It was like reading a letter from Heaven.

"Yesterday was Father's Day. My two daughters wished me a 'Happy Father's Day' first thing in the morning. But all day long, I couldn't help thinking about my son, Giovanni. When I got home, I started looking through his things, something I hadn't done since he died. I found greeting cards from friends, stickers of his football team, photographs... and a piece of paper in Giovanni's handwriting that began: 'Dear Dad...'". Massimo Raimondi is the "Dad" Giovanni addresses in the letter. He has kind eyes and working hands. Massimo spends his days assisting the needy at Rome's Caritas Centre, the Citadel of Charity that Pope Francis visited last December. He speaks slowly and thoughtfully as he tells the story of finding his son's letter.

The letter

Since Giovanni's death, nearly eight years ago, Massimo and his wife Anna have been trying to live their lives as best they can. They attend Mass regularly, together with their two daughters, Antonella and Alessandra. But Giovanni is always present. Every 23rd of June, the feast of St. John the Baptist, his friends gather to eat a pizza in his honor. Then, on 20 March 2019, Massimo came across an unread letter addressed to him from his son.

"Dear Dad, I know it may seem strange to you, but it's me, Giovanni, writing this letter. Every time our family was in some kind of trouble, you always blamed yourself. But maybe you didn't notice all the good you did. I could make a list for you, but it would fill a whole diary...".

Belief in ideals

Massimo was overcome with feelings of love and loss as he read the words of his deceased child. In the letter, Giovanni refers to the many challenges the family has had to face, situations "that would have broken anyone", he says. But he praises his father's ability to bounce back and to provide the family with a home and security. "Have you ever stopped to think", writes Giovanni, "about what you were able to build? Despite the difficulties, you continued believing in your ideals". Ideals like trusting in God's love and Providence, respecting others even if they fail to respect you, opening your home in welcome to those who have no home.

Welcoming others

That's what happened with Daniel whose mother was in prison. Massimo, Anna, Giovanni, Antonella and Alessandra became the child's Italian family. It all started when the prison chaplain of Rome's Rebibbia penitentiary asked Massimo to accompany a young boy on a visit to his mother who was serving a jail sentence there. Massimo was volunteering at the prison facility at the time. "Every Saturday I would collect Daniel from the religious community where he lived and take him back there afterwards", recalls Massimo. "But I realized the child needed something more". So Daniel started staying over at Massimo's house, playing with his children. Eventually, the Raimondi family took him into foster care.

A test of faith?

Giovanni's illness was totally unexpected. He woke up one morning and found he couldn't walk. The long trial of diagnoses, hospitalizations and unanswered questions began. His sisters and parents never left his side. When he died, the family was more united than ever. "Giovanni's death", says Massimo, "brought us together, thanks to our faith". On the day of the funeral, someone suggested the Lord was testing that faith. "Impossible, I said. The Lord I love so much, the Father who picked me up me so many times, couldn't take my son away from me".


He is with us

"I'm convinced he's in Heaven, waiting for us", says Massimo. "It feels like he's still with us: I see him in the kitchen, on the balcony when I'm watering the flowers". Giovanni lives on in the memories of those he loved, and who love him. They feel his presence and take comfort in imagining how happy he would have been to know he would soon be an uncle – to Nicholas, his sister's first child, and Massimo and Anna's first grandchild.

"Dear Dad, let me tell you with all my heart: you're a winner!"

Reading those lines from his son on Father's Day, says Massimo, was like reading something that came straight from Heaven.

Will You Say Yes?

You find yourself in the difficult situation of being accused of blasphemy and confronting possible execution. Your crime is believing in Jesus Christ. The question is then asked of you, "Are you a Christian, a follower of the one named Jesus Christ?" Your answer may very well dictate what happens to you next. What is your answer?

It is probably easier to answer this question when the scenario is make-believe. All of us want to believe that we would say yes to the question of belief in Jesus, but strange things happen when humans panic in the face of extreme stress. As we reflect on what we would say, there are those all over the world who are being asked that very same question. It is a question that was asked of many in the first centuries of the Church. Those who respond "yes" are considered martyrs and saints.

We might not usually think of all this in terms of good stewardship living. However, our faith is also a gift we have received from God to cultivate, grow, and share with others. The more interesting question than the one posed above is, "Would an accuser even think of asking you such a question?" Would you have cultivated, grown, and shared your faith enough that anyone would even consider you worthy of asking the question? They might assume you don't know Jesus Christ at all. I don't like conflict and do not seek out conflict, but I would rather someone ask the first question posed than assume there is no reason to confront me in the first place.



Live and love Jesus

God in Daily Life How do I bring God into the work of my daily life?

Whatever your daily work, you have an opportunity to encounter God and to follow His commandments in love. In the New Testament, we see that most of the Apostles didn't have a previous religious position. They were fishermen, tax collectors, and political activists. St. Paul was a tentmaker. Among the saints, we have doctors, lawyers, farmers, and stay-at-home moms. No matter your daily tasks, God can be present there!

One way concerns behavior. Start with an examination of conscience. Look at areas where you tend to struggle to imitate Christ at work. Do you gossip? Does brimming frustration become impatience at home? Pick one sin you struggle with, then choose a virtue to strengthen that area. If you tend to speak poorly of your co-workers, resolve to stop and to say one kind thing a day instead.

Another way relates to perspective, particularly your perspective of others. Jesus' incarnation reminds us of the value of every human being. Jesus is God, and each of us is created in God's image. When you encounter another person, you have an opportunity to see God in a new place and a new way — in that person in front of you.

Genuinely listen to them and be present to their concerns. Loving your neighbor is loving God! Our relationship with God and the love He inspires in our hearts shouldn't remain only at church on Sunday. We can - and should - let our faith animate our lives!









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
