Gospel Meditation

By Father John Muir

Right now, you and I are only worried about one of only two things: wind or water. Bear with me. This week we hear the account of the terrified disciples waking Jesus in a sea-storm. He chastises them for their lack of faith, and then, "rebuking the wind, he said to the sea, 'Quiet, be still!'" He rebukes the wind and stills the water. In the Bible wind and water represent the two most fundamental poles of our experience of creation. Wind means heaven, spirit, that which gives identity, unity, order, light. Water stands for earth, variation, potential, that which can be drawn into identity, darkness, chaos.

Too much "wind" is when things get way too rigid, abstract and ideological — when we face oppressive leaders and tyrants, when we get addicted to our own way of doing things, when our attention is too narrowly focused on one thing. Too much "water" is excessive novelty, passivity, indifference, and chaos — when our attention is too broadly diffused on many things, when things seem to be crumbling without direction into the dark abyss. We know both terrifying experiences all too well.

The point of the miracle is that God in Christ is the One who brings final cosmic harmony between these two vital but threatening forces. He ultimately does so from the wood of the cross, when he breathes forth the wind of his spirit and pours forth the water from his side to establish a new creation, filled with harmonious peace. When the wind and water are out of control, trust him.

Scripture Reflections

First Reading

God challenges Job not to question His power over creation. Have you ever challenged or questioned God in prayer?

Second Reading

Paul speaks of believers in Christ as a "new creation." In what ways do you sense something new in your life as a Christian?

Gospel

The disciples feared for their lives while caught in a violent storm until Jesus calmed the wind and the sea. When has your faith in Jesus helped calm your fears?

In 1983 the Cathedral of the Blessed Sacrament in Sacramento commissioned legendary musician Dave Brubeck to compose a variation of the Thomas Aquinas hymn "Pange Lingua, Gloriosi" ("Sing, My Tongue, the Savior's Glory"). The work beautifully captures the poetic spirit of the original Gregorian chant infused with Brubeck's signature jazz improvisation and interludes. It was Brubeck's first sacred composition since he had converted to Catholicism. The Dave Brubeck Quartet first performed the work in the Cathedral with orchestra and chorus over two nights in May, 1983 to sell-out audiences.

On Saturday, July 6 Grammy-nominated composer/musician Chris Brubeck, Dan Brubeck (sons of the late maestro), and pianist Joe Gilman will join the Cathedral of the Blessed Sacrament Choir and Orchestra to recreate this beautiful work in the historic and magnificent surroundings of the Cathedral, which celebrates its 135th anniversary this year. Tickets to the concert and an optional wine-and-cheese reception are now on sale!

An optional wine & cheese reception and tours of the Cathedral [\$50 per person] will be gin at 6 pm before the 8 pm performance. All proceeds will be used to support the Cathedral's Social Service Ministries.



Chemical abortion is now the most common form of abortion in the United States. Chemical abortion is a process that involves a pregnant woman taking a series of pills early in pregnancy to kill and expel a developing child from her womb. This form of abortion not only takes the life of a child, but also poses significant risks to the health and safety of women.

Despite these serious risks, chemical abortion is widely accessible. Since 2016, the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) has shown continued disregard for women's health by loosening safety standards, extending the limits of when the drugs can be used, and decreasing the number of required doctor's visits. Most recently, the FDA has allowed abortion pills to be prescribed through virtual appointments, ordered online, and made available at neighborhood pharmacies, enabling a nationwide mail-order abortion industry. In addition to putting women's health at risk, these policies also increase the chances that women may be exploited by violent partners or human traffickers. In March, the Supreme Court heard oral arguments in a case that has the potential to restore limitations to chemical abortion that the FDA has removed. The Supreme Court's decision is expected to be released in June. While the case before the Supreme Court will not end chemical abortion, there is the hope of curbing its accessibility and therefore protecting the lives of pre-born children and their mothers. Let us unite in prayer as we await the Court's ruling.

The Perfect Storm

I am writing this on a Saturday morning. Saturdays are my writing days, when my husband takes over the kids and the house and I disappear into the office with an enormous cup of coffee and noisecanceling headphones. Saturdays are sacred — if work can be called sacred.

But Saturday morning is also the only time I'm able to consistently get to confession. Every other time the sacrament is offered in my area during the week, I seem to have unavoidable commitments — but on Saturday morning, all I have is work, and how can I let work come before a sacrament, as much as I might secretly want to?

I've spent a good deal of time being bitter about this, because it's just not convenient, having to carve out time from work to run to the other side of town, especially when I get there and there's a line. I sit there in the sanctuary, waiting my turn, checking the clock, stewing, fretting. Obsessing over forgetting one of my sins. Thinking of how much work I have when I get home.

Saturday mornings: a perfect storm, I sometimes call it in my head.


I forge ahead, though. I've never gotten up and dashed back to my desk. I make it into the confessional and I stammer out my pathetic little list and receive absolution. Then I go before the tabernacle to perform my penance.

It's while I am kneeling there that it happens. Always. God awakens, and he cries into the depths of my heart: "Quiet! Be still! Why are you terrified? Do you not yet have faith?"

After teaching all day by the shore of the sea, Jesus asks his disciples to remove him from the crowds. He wants to escape the noise, the clamor, the disquiet. But the clamor follows him, because the world is full of it. Storms crop up wherever we go.

Jesus sleeps through the storm, because he understands what the disciples do not: the storms of the world cannot hurt us. They are only so much noise.

Mission Cooperative Appeal 2024 Mission Appeals

As part of the annual Mission Cooperation Plan, please welcome Fr. Alex Okiror from the Diocese of Soroti, Uganda. He is here this Sunday to celebrate all the Masses and to make the appeal. Below is a brief profile of the projects for which the Diocese of Soroti is seeking support. The Catholic faith continues to spread in leaps and bounds in the Diocese of Soroti. For example, every year there is an average of 30,000 Infant Baptisms. Every single Church parish in the entire Diocese is filled beyond capacity at its principal Sunday liturgies with a significant number of people standing outside the Church. After his episcopal ordination in May 2019, Bishop Joseph Eciru-Oliach had 22,600 Confirmations between June and December 0f 2019 alone! To meet the overwhelming need for pastoral services, the new bishop created 15 new parishes in the summer of 2019 and additional 13 since then. These new parishes are in dire need for buildings and other facilities (churches, rectories, halls and other health/ social/ educational amenities). The proceeds from this mission appeal will therefore be applied towards facilitating the development of these new parishes. The funds will especially be dedicated to the procurement of manufactured and/ or imported building products (cement, iron bars, roofing metals, iron sheets and paint) to enable the construction of buildings in the new parishes. In addition, most of these parishes are located in rural areas with no grid electricity and water systems. The proceeds will also be applied to securing solar electricity systems and water units: water wells/water boreholes/rain water harvesters. Every donation counts and nothing is too small. Here is a sample of what your donation could help purchase:

- \$10 can purchase one bag of cement
- \$25 can purchase one piece of roofing timber
- \$50 can purchase one bundle of 6 iron rods
- \$100 can purchase one bag of roofing nails
- \$100 can purchase one Roofing Iron Sheet
 - an purchase one Rooming from Sheet
- \$1,000 can purchase 800 Gallon Water Tank for rain-water harvest
- \$5,000 can purchase a solar unit to light up the Rectory
- \$10,000 can fund the construction of a water-well or borehole for perennial water supply


Mk 4:35-41

Why Do We Do That—Catholic Life Explained Gospel Differences

Why do the Gospels differ in their details? I was surprised to learn that not all of the Gospels tell the same stories, for example, the Nativity. Doesn't this take away from their credibility?

Take any event that happens, from family trips to national politics and ask two or three different people to explain what happened. You will get a different version of the same story. People tend to tell the story from their perspective, and past experience shades what we recall and how we recall it. Our choice of words and what details we leave in or out is also influenced by the audience who is listening to our tales.

The Gospel writers are no different. Each one tells the story of Jesus from their ow perspective. Versions differ in some details, not because one is true and the other is not,

but because each Gospel writer, or Evangelist, has a different theological point to communicate as well as a different audience for whom he is writing. He picks and chooses the details of his Gospel based on what message he is preaching, what his audience may already know, and what message they need to hear. The various details of the Gospels point more to their authenticity as a record of the church's experience and understanding of Jesus. In a good study Bible, the background notes for each Gospel contain a lot of information that helps us better understand each Evangelist and his message.
